The widespread sale of Thai rice in its original packaging in the local market is another visible evidence of smuggling.

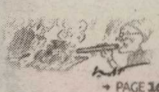
Visiting the other side of the border, one can see Malaysian subsidised items, such as sugar, cooking oil and flour, being sold openly in the market.
